Above the bar they intended to construct a club-room, and it was also contemplated providing a lavatory and bath-room. There would be a small bottle-and-jug department. A new entrance would be provided.—Supt. Murphy offered no objection, and the Bench, considering that the alteration would be a decided improvement, willingly approved of the plans.
