

For some years he was master at the Durham Cathedral choir school, and in September, 1914, he enlisted in the Public School Battalion, Royal Fusiliers. In June, 1915, he received his commission in the West Yorkshire Regiment. In August, 1916, he volunteered for the R.F.C. and on Saturday, April 14th, he received his certificate of efficiency and was expecting to be sent to the front immediately.
